



Violent Death Reporting System Initial Findings: 2019

Violent Death Facts

- Suicide is the 7th leading cause of death in Montana and the top cause of violent death. In 2019, the suicide rate was 31.9 deaths per 100,000 in Montana compared to 13.9 deaths in the United States
- A firearm was the most common mechanism for all violent deaths (56.3%) followed by hanging, strangulation, or suffocation (19.8%).
- Men were 2.7 times more likely to die of any violent death than women in 2019, and 2.9 times more likely to die by suicide than women.

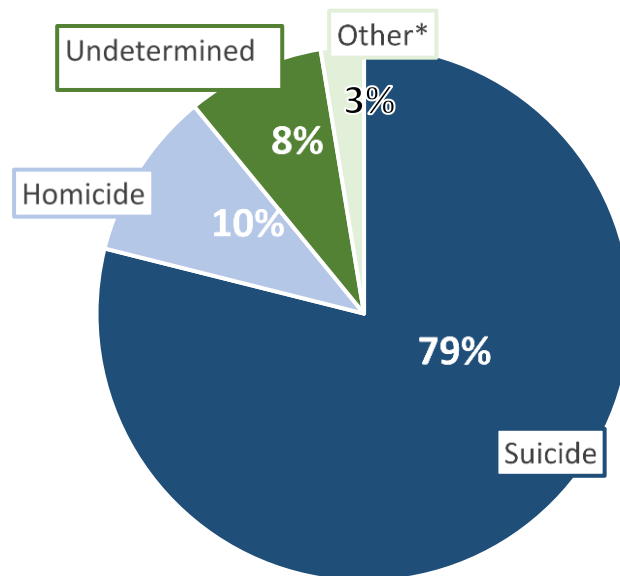

MT-VDRS collects data regarding violent deaths from death certificates, medical examiner reports, law enforcement reports and other health and legal documents. MT-VDRS links multiple source data documents to enable prevention specialists to better understand each violent death.

Suicide was the most common cause of violent death in Montana in 2019; 79% of violent deaths were suicides. 10% of all violent deaths in 2019 were homicides, followed by violent deaths of an undetermined intent at 8%.
