


Montana Text to 9-1-1 Accessibility



General Information

- Always contact 911 by making a voice call, if possible.
- If you are deaf, hard of hearing or have a speech disability, and Text-to-911 is not available, use a TTY or a telecommunications relay service, if possible.
- Cellular reception is required to send a text to 9-1-1.

How to use Text to 9-1-1 Messaging

- The counties highlighted on the map above are currently Text to 9-1-1 accessible. This is a living list that will change as more counties adopt text to 9-1-1.
- To text 9-1-1 compose a text message addressed to the number 911 (No Dashes).
- Include your name, location, and the nature of your emergency.
- If you attempt to send a text to 911 where the service is not yet available, you will be sent an automatic "bounce-back" message that will advise you to contact emergency services by another means, such as making a voice call or using a telecommunications relay service.
