

Children's Special Health Services (CSHS) Section

- **Mission**

- To support families with children and youth with special healthcare needs, with an emphasis on the medical home and transition to adult care.

- **Vision**


- Families are able to navigate the healthcare system with ease, and find the specific health services their child needs at the time he or she needs it.

CSHS Section

Programs

- **Parent Partner Program**
 - Parent of a CYSHCN mentors other families and offers support
- **Circle of Parents (COP)**
 - Parent support group for CYSHCN
- **Montana Medical Home Portal**
 - Diagnostic, treatment and local resource information
- **Transition Project**
 - Training and resources for families facing the transition of a CYSHCN to adulthood
- **Financial Assistance**
 - Qualifying families receive funds to assist with out-of-pocket expenses
- **Genetic Testing**
 - Funds to pay for genetic testing for all uninsured and underinsured Montanans
- **Newborn Screening Program**
 - Every baby in MT receives metabolic, hearing and critical congenital heart disease (CCHD) screening at birth

Healthy Montana Families (HMF) Home Visiting Program Section

- **Mission**

- To nurture healthy parent-child relationships, build resilient families, robust children, and connected communities.


- **Vision**

- To build a network of support for positive parenting and improve the health and well-being, including the social and emotional competence of children.


HMF Home Visiting Program Section

- MHV in 27 sites/19 counties; 2 AI reservations (currently working on 3rd AI)
- 2,364 children have been served
 - Well child visits; Immunizations; Developmental screenings
- 2,132 primary caregivers/families have been served
 - Prenatal care; Postpartum visits; Breastfeeding assistance; Depression and IPV screenings; Economic self-sufficiency; Educational attainment; Positive parent-child interaction training; Health insurance; Family planning; Referrals to community services
- Over 25,000 home visits have been provided
- One year post-enrollment
 - 81% of children and 85% of mothers decreased or maintained their number of ED visits
 - 92% of children decreased the number of child injuries that required medical treatment
 - 92% of children and mothers had health insurance
- 100% of mothers and children were referred for needed services (e.g., health care; mental health; drug abuse treatment; WIC; TANF; housing; DV shelter)
- 92% of mothers were screened and referred for family planning services

MCH Section

Title V / MCH Block Grant Programs

- Provides financial support to local public health departments and state MCH programs
 - *Local public health departments* are addressing national and state performance measures in the following areas
 - Access to Care and Public Health Services
 - Breastfeeding
 - Child Injuries
 - Family Support and Health Education
 - Immunizations
 - Oral Health
 - Smoking During Pregnancy and in Household
 - Teen Pregnancy Prevention

MCH Section

State-Level Funding

- The following state programs receive MCH Block Grant support:
 - Children's Special Health Services
 - Fetal, Infant, Child and Maternal Mortality Review (FICMMR)
 - Newborn Metabolic and Hearing Screening
 - Family Planning
 - Maternal and Child Health Coordination
 - Office of Epidemiology and Scientific Support
 - Primary Care Office

MCH Section

MCHBG Demographics – Individuals Served
Reporting FY 2016

- Number pregnant women – 5,571
- Number infants under one – 12,279
- Number children 1 to 22 years of age – 44,896
- Number children with special health care needs – 4,812
- Number others (particularly women of childbearing age 22-44) – 58,211

- Total served = 125,769

MCH Section

FICMMR

- **Local Fetal, Infant, Child & Maternal Mortality Review (FICMMR)** teams have completed reviews of all deaths in 2005-2016
 - All data entered into the Child Death Review (CDR) System
 - Local FICMMR team's Injury Prevention Activities underway (e.g., Suicide Prevention; Car Seat Installation; Distracted Driving; Infant Safe Sleep)
 - Data are currently being analyzed

MCH Section

Oral Health & Primary care

- **Oral Health Program**

- Collaborating with Tobacco Prevention, Cardiovascular Program, MCH, Medicaid, Tribal Health, MT Health Care Foundation
- Partnership with the University of Washington School of Dentistry resulting in over 2400 dental procedures in high-need areas
- Pilot program to increase the number of pregnant women receiving dental care
- March 12, 2018, applied for HRSA renewal funding (award in July, 2018)

- **Primary Care Office**

- Provide Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) designations
 - Advantages: Student loan repayment; Medicare reimbursement; Rural Health Clinic Certification; Scholarships; Special Considerations (when applying for federal programs)
- With State Loan Repayment Program funds, provided approx. \$150,000 to 20 healthcare providers (student loan debt payment – in exchange for 2-year commitment)

Women, Infants & Children (WIC)/Nutrition Section

- **Mission**

- The Montana WIC program provides nutrition education, breastfeeding support, healthy food and referrals for women, infants and children to ensure that families in Montana are empowered to a healthy start in life.

- **Vision**

- To establish the foundation for a lifetime of health.


WIC/Nutrition Section

- **WIC provides:**
 - Participant-centered nutrition and breastfeeding education and support (including pumps)
 - Supplemental foods that target specific nutritional issues for this population, including:
 - Folic acid
 - Iron
 - Calcium
 - Vitamin A, C & D
 - Protein
 - Referrals and service coordination for health and social services
 - Ensuring children and women are receiving medical care (e.g., well baby; prenatal)
 - Coordinating immunizations for 0-2 year olds; providing information on programs such as home visiting, Medicaid, SNAP, TANF, food banks, etc.

WIC/Nutrition Section

- Serves about 17,000 women, infants and children monthly in 29 local agencies, serving 85 communities including all 7 AI reservations
- About \$13 million/year is spent in food dollars
- Farmers Market coupons are offered through 8 local agencies
- Marked improvement in breastfeeding rates; Breastfeeding Peer Counselors are available through 13 local agencies
- *eWIC* card system to deliver food benefits to participants
 - No more checks- less stigma, easier shopping experience
 - More efficient for state, locals and retailers
 - Deployed in September, 2017
- 2017 Governor's Award for Excellence

Women's and Men's Health (WMH) Section

- **Mission**

- To provide affordable, confidential, quality reproductive health services that respect, empower and educate individuals, families and communities.

- **Vision**

- All Montanans achieving planned reproductive health outcomes resulting from informed decision-making and affordable access to care.

WMH Section

Title X Family Planning Program

- Provides confidential, voluntary services to prevent or achieve pregnancy, including:
 - Contraceptives
 - Pregnancy Testing
 - STD Screening and Treatment
 - Cancer Screening
 - Healthy Lifestyle Counseling and Referrals (e.g., exercise and nutrition, tobacco cessation, immunizations)

2016 Title X Client Characteristics



Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)

- Provides evidence-based curriculum to middle and high school students, focusing on:
 - Abstinence
 - Contraception
 - Healthy Relationships
 - Healthy Life Skills
 - Adolescent Development


2016 PREP Outcomes

- 64.9% of participants reported the program made them "less" or "much less" likely to have sex in the next 6 months
- 85.1% of participants who may have sex in the next 6 months said the program made them "more" or "much more" likely to use condoms in the next 6 months
- 78.2% of participants who may have sex in the next 6 months said the program made them "more" or "much more" likely to use birth control in the next 6 months

- Provides sexual violence prevention programming on five Montana college campuses, focusing on:
 - Healthy Relationships
