Efforts like the IECMH initiative show a long-term commitment to addressing these challenges through systemic reform, capacity building, and cross-sector collaboration.

	 Over 20% of Montana children under age 5 live below the federal poverty line. 7% of these children are uninsured, highlighting significant health care access issues.

	 Montana ranks 30th in the U.S. for early childhood health factors. Youth and adolescents show higher-than-average rates of anxiety and depression.
