


CHILDREN IN POVERTY AND FAMILIES SERVED BY THE NUMBERS

2023



"Head Start children have a higher likelihood of graduating high school, attending college, and receiving a postsecondary degree, license or certificate" Early Head Start (EHS) and Head Start (HS) are a critical part of Montana's early care and education system.

- Head Start promotes economic stability, participants are 12% less likely to live in poverty as adults and 29% less likely to receive public assistance.
- EHS/HS provide low-income and vulnerable families, pregnant women, and children up to the age of five an opportunity to succeed in school and life.
- These quality, federal to locally funded programs offer comprehensive services including education, health, nutrition, family engagement, and mental health services and supports.
- Head Start is governed by parents through policy Councils- parents engage in shared decision-making, program planning, and selfassessments.



Head Start Workforce – knowledgeable, reflective, and passionate about helping children grow and develop.

- In 2023 in Montana, the average Head Start teacher with a bachelor's degree made \$38,320 per year, compared to an average kindergarten teacher salary of \$ 58,276.

COMPREHENSIVE SERVICES

Head Start takes a comprehensive approach to meeting the needs of young children and their families. There are four pillars in every program:

Education: Learning experiences support intellectual, social, and emotional growth

Health Services: Immunizations, dental, medical, and mental health support, nutritional services, and early screenings ensure healthy development

Family Involvement: Opportunities for parents and caregivers to be involved in decision making, participate in classes, and volunteer in the program strengthen families

Wraparound Support: Tailored services meet local and individual needs and link children and families to community supports


DISABILITY SERVICES

Speech and Language and Developmental Delays are the primary disabilities for Head Start children


CURRICULUM, ASSESSMENT AND SCREENING UTILIZATION




