Description of the challenge the State agency is seeking to solve, the goal of the waiver to improve services under the Program, and the expected outcomes if the waiver is granted. (iii) Frequency and type of required facility reviews.

Sponsoring organizations must review each facility three times each year, except as described in paragraph (d)(4)(iv) of this section.

In addition: (D) Not more than six months may elapse between reviews.

Detailed description of alternative procedures and anticipated impact on Program operations, including technology, State systems, and monitoring:

The State of Montana would like to be able to support social distancing for the State Agency, Sponsoring Organizations, and center staff--using virtual monitoring and digital data, to support efforts to slow the spread of communicable diseases, when Child and Adult Care institutions are operational.

When Child and Adult Care institutions are not operational as a result of preventive measures for the transmission of communicable disease, the State Agency is requesting a waiver to extend the time between monitoring visits as needed on a case by case basis. The approval and establishment of this waiver would reduce the risk of disease transmission for all individuals who participate in, work for, and monitor Child Care establishments.

Description of any steps the State has taken to address regulatory barriers at the State level. [Section 12(l)(2)(A)(ii) of the NSLA]:

The State of Montana is establishing contingency plans for conducting business remotely as needed.

Anticipated challenges State or eligible service providers may face with the waiver implementation: Access issues and lack of technology.

Description of how the waiver will not increase the overall cost of the Program to the Federal Government. If there are anticipated increases, confirm that the costs will be paid from non-Federal funds. [Section 12(l)(1)(A)(iii) of the NSLA]:

There will be no increase to the overall cost of the Program as a result of the waiver implementations.

Anticipated waiver implementation date and time period: 3/16/2020-12/31/2020, unless potential for disease transmission decreases the need for social distancing.

This waiver is being submitted less than 60 calendar days prior to the anticipated implementation date as a result of a state of emergency in Montana having been declared yesterday. 3/15/2020.

Proposed monitoring and review procedures:

Documentation and records for reviews and monitoring will be submitted and evaluated electronically. Skype Meeting (or equivalent) will be used to view required on-site implementations as well as the meal service. If virtual reviews and monitoring are not available that the time of the review—the review will be postponed until a mutually agreed upon time and day becomes available.

Proposed reporting requirements (include type of data and due date(s) to FNS):

The State Agency will Provide FNS with the State Agencies tentative monitoring schedule for calendar year 2020 if requested. Status updates for monitoring would be tracked and provided at defined intervals. This would include the institution, last review year, anticipated review date, actual review date. If deviations in review date occur, an explanation will be provided, as well as plan and date for anticipated compliance.

Sponsoring organizations will provide the State Agency with the same defined information regarding last review, anticipated date for the next review, actual review date, and if deviations in review dates occur, an explanation will be provided, as well as plan and date for anticipated compliance. This information can be provided to FNS if requested.

"Similar to all Child Nutrition Programs, meals served in the CACFP are intended to be consumed in settings where organized groups of eligible children and adults are gathered to eat. This means that meals must be consumed on-site in order for the meal to be reimbursable. From time to time, CACFP operators may want to serve meals offsite, such as during a field trip. This is allowable, provided that the CACFP institution provide notice to their State agency prior to the event. Failure to meet this "congregate feeding" requirement will result in the disallowance of meals and may lead to a determination of serious deficiency in the Program."

6. Detailed description of alternative procedures and anticipated impact on Program operations, including technology, State systems, and monitoring:

If this waiver is approved, the State of Montana CACFP staff will provide technical assistance to all institutions on process and procedures for planning and preparing non-congregate meal services. Additionally, TA will be provided, for required and accurate record keeping that supports claims for reimbursement. There will be no impacts on technology, state systems, or monitoring.

- 7. Description of any steps the State has taken to address regulatory barriers at the State level. [Section 12(l)(2)(A)(ii) of the NSLA]: State Level regulatory barriers related to this specific issue, involve the requirement for family style meal services in the Child and Adult Care setting. This requirement will be waived for the duration of the crisis.

food insecurity will be decreased.

226.20 Requirements for Meals

- (a) *Food components*. Except as otherwise provided in this section, each meal served in the Program must contain, at a minimum the food components outlined in 226.20.
- (c) Meal patterns for children age 1 through 18 and adult participants. Institutions and facilities must serve the food components and quantities specified in the meal patterns for children and adult participants in order to qualify for reimbursement.

If this waiver is approved, the State of Montana CACFP staff will provide technical assistance to all institutions on process and procedures for planning and preparing meals/snacks and documenting food inventory usage. There will be no impacts on t technology, state systems, and monitoring.

The State Agency would utilize flexibilities in Meal Service policies during the effected timeframe.

Area eligibility. Except for emergency shelters, at-risk afterschool care centers must be located in an area described in paragraph (a) of the *Eligible area* definition in §226.2

226.2 Eligible area means:

(a) For the purpose of determining the eligibility of at-risk afterschool care centers, the attendance area of a school in which at least 50 percent of the enrolled children are certified eligible for free or reduced-price school meals

6. Detailed description of alternative procedures and anticipated impact on Program operations, including technology, State systems, and monitoring:

Montana CACFP will provide detailed instructions for providers opting to participate as an At-Risk After School Site under this waiver. There is no anticipated impact to program operations

Description of any steps the State has taken to address regulatory barriers at the State level. [Section 12(l)(2)(A)(ii) of the NSLA]:

There are no state-level regulatory barriers related to this specific issue. All facilities potentially supported by these flexibilities and waivers are not required to be licensed.

7. Anticipated challenges State or eligible service providers may face with the waiver implementation:

Montana CACFP does not anticipate that this waiver will present any challenges to the State agency or providers. If the waiver is not approved in a timely manner and implementation does not happen right away there are concerns Montana will not benefit from the intended impacts.

8. Description of how the waiver will not increase the overall cost of the Program to the Federal Government. If there are anticipated increases, confirm that the costs will be paid from non-Federal funds. [Section 12(l)(1)(A)(iii) of the NSLA]:

Many childcare facilities have already closed in Montana due to Covid-19. Therefore, the State Agency does not expect the number of new facilities, facilities that may reopen, and increased reimbursement to exceed what the Program typically pays out to sub-recipients under normal circumstances.

9. Anticipated waiver implementation date and time period:

Effective immediately upon approval from USDA-FNS. CACFP requests the waiver be approved through June 30, 2020, or when the pandemic ends, whichever comes sooner.

10. Proposed monitoring and review procedures:

Montana CACFP will work with providers through the application process and the reporting requirements of this waiver. Monitoring will include documentation of providers utilizing the waiver during the public health emergency. Implementation of this waiver will be monitored by

State Agency Staff as outlined through the review process in order to ensure compliance with regulatory requirements.

11. Proposed reporting requirements (include type of data and due date(s) to FNS):

Within 1 year of the waiver implementation--CACFP will report to FNS the number of At-Risk Afterschool sites participating in CACFP under this waiver, the total number of meals reimbursed under these arrangements, and the total amount of CACFP dollars spent for meals reimbursed under these conditions as requested.
