Dorothy Mundt 100 Years Old

Dorothy, a native of Westby, Montana, was born on February 17, 1924. After completing her high school education, she married Sam Hammer and raised four children. A trailblazer in her field, Dorothy spent most of her career as an Immigration Inspector, making history as the first woman to hold this position on the Montana-Canada border. A lifelong abstainer from alcohol and tobacco, and a dedicated consumer of whole foods, Dorothy credits her healthy lifestyle for her longevity. She currently makes her home in Whitefish, Montana.



Jean F. DuPaul 100 Years Old

Born on September 6, 1924, in Williston, North Dakota, Jean was raised on a farm with her two sisters. After graduating high school and a semester of college, she briefly taught in a one-room schoolhouse with four students before marrying Walter DePaul. Together they welcomed nine children. Seeking better opportunities, the family relocated to Great Falls, Montana in 1962. Jean recalls the birth of her twins while caring for a sick child as a defining moment in her life. She credits motherhood as the key to her longevity.



Helena Stefaniak 100 Years Old

Helena was born in Warsaw. Poland on February 25, 1924. Helena's wouth was tragically interrupted by the German Nazi occupation. Forced to continue her education in a clandestine homeschool setting, her life took a harrowing turn in 1944 when she was abducted from the streets of Warsaw and sent to a German forced labor camp. Separated from her beloved sister, Barbara, Helena endured years of uncertaintu and fear. Their eventual reunion in 1947. after the war's end. was the most jouous moment of her life. Immigrating to the United States. Helena found love with John Stefaniak and together theu raised a child. A dedicated homemaker, she also contributed to her family's livelihood by working in the garment industry. She attributes her longevity to a simple philosophy: embracing life's pleasures, including her love of sweets, without the constraints of restrictive diets. Daisy Dutton 100 Years Old

Daisy was born in Sumatra, Montana on August 4, 1924. She has lived a life filled with resilience, love and unwavering faith. She graduated from Garfield County High School in 1942. During WWII, Daisy was a "Rosie the Riveter", working in a B-24 assembly plant in San Diego. She installed wiring in the wings and signed the 500th B-24 inside the bomb bay. Her future husband, Joseph Dutton, saw her signature while stationed in Italy. Daisy married Joseph in 1946 and together they raised five children on the Dutton Ranch west of Sand Springs. In 1948, life presented a challenge, as their ranch house burned down as Daisy was ready to deliver their eldest son. This forced them to live in a sheep wagon where their young children learned to adapt. Her eldest daughter had to learn to walk because there was no room to crawl. After several months they were able to move into a partially completed house on the ranch. Daisy's adaptability shone through many times while operating the Sand Springs Store and frequently welcoming stranded travelers until the weather cleared. A woman of deep faith and boundless love, Daisy's family is her greatest treasure including all the nieces, nephews and neighbors she mothered. With a motto of "We'll see" and a favorite verse from Proverbs 3:5-6, "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all ways acknowledge him and he shall direct thy paths," she has faced life's challenges with grace and determination. Daisy's secret to longevity is faith, hard work and having the love of her family. She has proven time and again that adversity cannot dim her light, and her legacy of resilience and compassion will continue to inspire generations to come.





Adeline Carpenter 100 Years Old

Born in Glendive, Montana on July 29, 1924, Adeline completed her education through the eighth grade and dedicated her life to homemaking. A beloved matriarchal figure, she is affectionately known as "Auntie" to her many nieces and nephews.



Charles Joseph Hucke 100 Years Old

Charles was born in Broadview, Montana on November 11, 1923. He served his country during WWII with the US Army AirCorps. His bravery was tested when his fighter plane was shot down and he became a prisoner of war in Germany. The most profound moment of his life, he says, was his liberation from a prison hospital in Heppenheim, Germany. Returning home, Charles married Dorothy in 1948. Together they built a family with four children. In the early 60s, with a degree in Business from the University of Montana, Charles and a partner bought Timberweld Manufacturing. He was heavily involved in running the business along with sales and marketing. When Charles was 60 he bought out his partner and ran the business as its President. When he turned 80 he turned over the business to his son, Doug, though Charles continued to work into his early 90s. A lover of the outdoors, he has spent countless hours hunting, fishing, skiing, camping and backpacking. His adventurous spirit extended to the skies where he piloted his own plane throughout his career. Charles' commitment to a healthy lifestyle has been a cornerstone of his long life. He has never smoked or drank, attributing his longevity to hard work and the enduring love of family and friends.



Dr. Donald Harr 100 Years Old

Donald was born on October 30, 1923 in Emporia, Kansas, Donald obtained his Doctor of Medicine from Northwestern University School of Medicine. A transformative spiritual experience during his medical studies had a profound effect on his life. leading him to a deeper understanding of God and God's presence and influence in our lives. After marrying Shirley in September 1950 and starting a family of four, Don and Shirley decided to leave the city life of Kansas City in search of a more child-friendly environment. Drawn by the presence of his brother's family in Billings, Don realized a significant need for psychiatrists in the area. He subsequently moved to Billings and established a psychiatry and neurology practice with Dr. Bryce Hughett, becoming the second psychiatrist in the citu. Don attributes his success to being in the right place at the right time. He dedicated many years to advocating for improved mental health laws in Montana, working closely with lawmakers and government officials. He is particularly proud of his work with Dr. Hughett on legislation requiring legal representation for patients undergoing involuntary mental health commitment. This groundbreaking law was enacted on July 1, 1975. Throughout his career. Don held various positions in the field of mental health, including working in private practice, Director of the Mental Health Hygiene Clinic and the Mental Health Center in Billings, serving as a Medical Director of the Deaconess Psychiatric Unit and Montana Youth Treatment Center and physician for the Yellowstone Boys Ranch. Even after retirement, he continued to contribute to the field by working as a locum tenens physician and advocating for mental health causes. Don has been a dedicated community member, volunteering for initiatives like the Yellowstone Valley American Foundations for Suicide Prevention Walk and serving on the Mental Health Advisory Board. His lifelong commitment to improving mental health services and supporting his community has had a lasting impact. Don has always been a passionate advocate for the outdoors and environmental conservation. In his free time he enjoyed rafting on rivers like the Colorado and skiing on various slopes. A devoted family man, Don encouraged his children to actively participate in their communities and make positive choices in their lives. He is quided by his Christian Theophilosphy, believing in living life to the fullest, learning from the past and living with purpose for the future. Nyla Prosser 101 Years Old

Born in Linton, North Dakota on September 19, 1923, Nyla grew up on a small farm during the Great Depression. She and her siblings shared the responsibilities of farm labor, including chores like haying and milking cows. Nyla has always said that her brother would tell her they were poor, but they did not know it because everyone else was in the same boat. Despite her demanding upbringing, Nyla developed a love for music. She began singing at the young age of 3 and learned to play the piano by ear. At 11, she joined the adult choir at her local church and soon found herself performing with her sister at various churches throughout North Dakota. Their duo, known as the "Sweet Harmonies," became popular in the region. Nyla's musical talent also led her to audition for a local radio station, where she and her sister eventually hosted their own program on air. Nyla met her future husband, Kenneth, when she was 14. After he returned from serving in World War II, they married and had four children. Nyla worked in various roles, including as a dishwasher and nurse's aide, despite having only an eighth-grade education. Her family enjoyed camping and big family gatherings that included pinochle and camaraderie. Nyla's longevity can be attributed to her resilience and tenacity. While she didn't follow a strict diet or exercise regimen, her positive outlook and hard work ethic has undoubtedly contributed to her long and fulfilling life.



Muriel Wild 100 Years Old

Mary Marquez Sierra 100 Years Old

Mary was born in Los Angeles, California on September 7, 1924. She graduated from Garfield High School in California in 1943. During WWII she worked in an airplane factory. She spent most of her career in banking and dedicated 20 years to missionary work in Hawaii. Mexico and Browning where she founded a food bank. A pivotal moment in her life was witnessing her daughter's ability to have children, culminatina in the birth of twins. In the 1980s, her daughter moved to Montana and Mary soon followed to assist with the twins. Mary discovered her artistic abilities in her 50s and began teaching painting to children, later organizing painting classes at the senior apartment complex where she lives. Mary has used her talents to give back to others, selling her paintings and holding yard sales to raise funds for those in need. Rosie Riggins 100 Years Old

She recalls witnessing the awe-inspiring sight of airplanes and the remarkable advancements in road infrastructure as some of the most significant events in her life. She attributes her longevity to her hardworking nature, keeping busy and maintaining an active lifestyle.



Mickael Teig 108 Years Old

Born on May 17, 1916 on the family ranch near Lebo, Montana, Mickael Teig was the eighth of eleven children. Growing up under the shadow of the Crazy Mountains, he developed a deep love for the outdoors and a strong work ethic. Mickael was a polyglot, speaking both Norwegian and English by the age of six. He and his brother, Emmet, shared a passion for music, often entertainina locals with their accordion skills. Their musical talent was such that they could learn new songs by ear after just a few listens. Mickael married Betti Jane in 1954, and together they ranched near Martinsdale and Nihill. They were devoted to their Angus cattle and their land, working side by side for over five decades until Betti's passing in 2007. A lifelong Christian, Mickael continues to enjoy reading, especially mysteries, and watching the news. At the age of 100 he taught himself to play the violin. His secret to longevity? "Good Norwegian roots, hard work, and taking a good chew of snoose."



William Hocker 100 Years Old

William was born on March 23, 1924 in Helena, Montana. Following high school, he and his childhood best friend enlisted in the Navy, but they were assigned to the Army instead. They served in WWII from 1944 to 1946 in Italy. After returning home, William married Phyllis in 1950, and together they raised seven children. He spent his life working as a farmer and still resides in the house where he grew up. William attributes his long life to maintaining a sense of humor and enjoying a bit of chocolate every day.



MaryAnn Pitsch 100 Years Old

MaryAnn was born on April 11, 1924 in Sheridan, Wyoming. After high school, she worked as a telephone operator and did general office work. Following her marriage to Arthur, they purchased land in Montana. In early January 1951, they left Clearmont, Wyoming, in an old beet truck loaded with furniture and her piano, heading for the Little Big Horns on the Crow reservation. MaryAnn, her 2 year old son and 3.5 month-old daughter stayed upon arrival and her Arthur headed back for the second load. That first night, MaryAnn spent with her children, a few dozen mice and worries about intruders filled her mind - quite an adventure for a city girl from Sheridan. This marked the beginning of a 69-year stay on the farm before she moved to Billings at the age of 96. She cherished her life on the farm, despite her dislike for milking cows. MaryAnn considers the birth of her children and becoming Christian as the most significant events in her life. She often quotes, "And that's the way it went," "just us chickens," and "for crying in a bucket," and attributes her longevity to God's will.



Thelma Hogan 102 Years Old

Thelma was born on June 4, 1922 in Gurskoy, Norway. After moving to the United States, she graduated from Stadium High School in Tacoma, Washington. She married Ed Hogan in 1949, and together they left their hometowns - Tacoma, Washington and Magnus. Arkansas - to build a new life. During Ed's military service, they lived in various states, including Washington, North Carolina, Virginia, Alaska (twice), and Arizona, before settling in Missoula, Montana in 1966 near where Ed had been in a Civilian Conservation Corps camp as a teenager. Ed became the Armu ROTC Sergeant Major at the University of Montana, while Thelma worked as a secretary and homemaker. She stayed active through gardening, cooking, volunteering, and maintaining connections with others. Even today, she walks to lunch and dinner at a brisk pace. She lived in Van Nuys, California before settling in Stevensville, Montana. Throughout her life, Maria dedicated herself to being a loving homemaker. She is the proud mother of two, grandmother to four, greatgrandmother to four, and great-grandmother to six cherished children. Maria credits her long and fulfilling life to her daily walks and a steady diet of oatmeal.





Mary Ladas 100 Years Old

Mary was born on June 25, 1924, in Billings, Montana. She completed her formal education at the age of 13. During WWII, she worked as a "Rosie the Riveter" in California, a job she cherished. Mary was among the first women employed at the Billings Sugar Beet Factory and later held positions as a secretary at Shell Oil, Senior High School, the Billings Courthouse, and as a copywriter for a radio station. She married Louis Ladas, and together they raised a family. Mary was ahead of her time in house flipping, skillfully remodeling and designing homes before it became popular. She regularly donated blood until she was deemed too old to continue. Passionate about cooking and baking Greek dishes, her secret to longevity included a daily glass of wine and following a Mediterranean diet. Minnie Hirst 100 Years Old

Minnie was born on March 3, 1924, in Birch Creek, Montana, where she grew up surrounded by the love of her family. She lost her father when she was just 17, but she always cherished the memories of him playing his fiddle during the long winter evenings. She and her sisters would dance to his music, a memory that stayed close to her heart. Minnie, also loved the weekend dances at the neighbor's homes, where the community came together to share joy. In 1946, Minnie married Clarence Hirst, and together they lovingly raised eight children. Despite the demands of a large family. Minnie was full of life and energy. She had a passion for fishing and trapping beaver and mink, and she loved to travel—especially her annual trips to Jackpot, Nevada. Walking with her dog and cat, playing bingo, and knitting sweaters for her loved ones were some of the simple pleasures she enjoyed most. Minnie often reflects on her life, acknowledging the hardships of the early years, but she never lost hope. She believed that better days were always ahead. Her resilience and optimism were a testament to the strength she inherited from her mother and sisters, all of whom lived to be between 90 and 100 years old.



William "Chuck" Hubing Jr. 100 Years Old

William "Chuck" was born on September 7, 1924 in Glendive , Montana. When Chuck was a kid, he traveled with his dad, Will, a livestock buyer throughout eastern Montana. Will and Chuck bought horses, cows, sheep and whatever else requested from contacts Will had in Wisconsin and back East. Around the age 14, Chuck quit school and went to work for Haughian Livestock, a huge cattle and sheep ranch between Miles City and Terry. Times were hard during the 30s and 40s, and there were few fences from Miles City to Terry extending north to Brockway/Circle area and beyond. Those wide-open spaces were home to bunches of wild horses. To earn extra money, Chuck and his friends, a wild bunch of cowbous, would aather the wild horses and trail them to the Conlin Corrals or Brockway Stockyards. At that time, the Brockway Stockyards was one of the largest shipping hubs in eastern Montana. The horses were then sorted, depending upon the needs of the buyers back east, and shipped by train to locations throughout the United States, and even on to Europe. It was truly the Wild West in as these cowboys were most often riding barely trained horses and gathering wild, unbroken horses on the open range. Trying to stop a large herd of wild horses with no fences to slow them down was dangerous at best. Chuck did not inherit a ranch or cattle or a business. He started out as a hired man. Slowly, he gathered together a few cows, horses and sheep. He married a hometown girl and had three daughters. Because he couldn't afford to buy a ranch as a young man, he leased grazing pastures and small ranches all over eastern Montana and western North Dakota expanding his herd. In the late 60s, Chuck and a group of Montana ranchers were involved in a ranching operation in Australia. Chuck made several trips to Australia where he and his partners gathered wild cattle, which were free for the taking. He discovered that the wild cattle, especially bulls, were harder to gather in Australia than his early days of rounding up wild horses in eastern Montana. In 1969, Chuck and Charlotte leased a ranch south of Broadus on the Little Powder River. In 1974, they purchased the ranch and set out to increase their herd and improve the land. Over the years the C & C Cattle Company developed an expansive water system on nearly 36 sections of land and cleared flats, hillsides and river bottoms of sagebrush in an effort to increase their hau production. In 2012, they sold the ranch and retired to Miles City. In 2013, Chuck was inducted into the Montana Cowboy Hall of Fame. Chuck has lived a big life and widened his horizons along the way whether stepping out of a hotel in Paris or walking for coffee in the Middle East, his cowboy boots and cowboy hat are as distinctive as he is.



Inez Pounds 102 Years Old

Inez was born on September 8, 1922, in Charlo, Montana, and graduated from Charlo High School. Inez married Elmer Freshour on August 20, 1942, and they were married for an impressive 52 years. After Elmer's passing, she married Carl Pounds in 2000, and they were together for 11 years. Inez has three children. She dedicated herself to being a homemaker while actively engaging in various community service activities. Her secret to her long life revolves around factors like inheritance, maintaining a healthy diet, cherishing family bonds, fostering love, upholding faith, and finding happiness in life. In her later years, Inez made the decision to move into a house with five of her sisters when she was 90 years old. This experience has been described as wonderful, with a harmonious living arrangement where everyone contributed and supported each other. She and her youngest sister are still living together.

Leonard Dahl 101 Years Old

Leonard Dahl was born on September 19, 1923, in North Gate, North Dakota. His family moved to Montana when he was a child. When Leonard was in high school, Pearl Harbor was attacked. Upon graduating at the end of that year, he joined the Army. They didn't send him to his first duty assignment until 1943. He was sent to New Caledonia and assigned to the 43rd Infantry Division. Soon he was in combat in New Guinea. In 1944 he was sent to the Philippines awaiting orders to be part of the impending invasion of Japan. Then the atom bombs were dropped on Japan and the war was over. After the Army, Leonard received his B.A. in Accounting from the University of Montana. There helaid eyes on his future wife, Marguerite. After graduating from college, he took a job in Great Falls. Soon Marquerite was also hired by the same company. After a while he got up the nerve to ask her out and the rest was history. They have been married for 73 years. They have endured many ups and downs in the economy and lots of social changes. Nevertheless, they were able to deal with even the hardest of times and always moved as a couple, devoted and dedicated to one another.



Marklyn Lynn 100 Years Old

She found the greatest joy in the simple moments of life: marriage, children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and the incredible experiences of traveling to 15 countries, including Spain, New Zealand, and Morocco. Marklyn's secret to longevity is a positive outlook and a focus on happiness and the enduring power of relationships.

Lola VanCampen 107 Years Old

Lola was born on January 7, 1917 in Idaho. She attended college at the University of Idaho and became a teacher. Lola married Ned VanCampen and together they raised three children. At the age of 93, she relocated to Montana to live with her daughter. She attributes her long life to her active lifestyle, often saying that the human body was meant to move. A devout woman of faith, Lola finds solace and strength in prayer. She believes in its power for her loved ones and will hold onto that belief until her last breath.



Virginia Olson 102 Years Old

Virginia Olson was born on October 10, 1921, in Wales, North Dakota. She completed her education through the 8th grade which was considered normal at the time for airls. Virginia's life took an interesting turn when she visited an aunt and uncle in Portland, Oregon. Through a friend in North Dakota, she was able to secure a job in the shipyards, which were highly sought-after positions at the time. It was during this period that she met her future husband. Walter Olson, at a Chamber of Commerce dance, However, their budding romance faced a temporary separation when Walter had to leave for the war. Fortunatelu. after his return. theu reunited and decided to tie the knot on April 28, 1947. Walter's father, Elis Olson, asked Virginia and Walter to return to the family ranch in Warrick, Montana. They spent many happy years there, raising four children together. Throughout her life. Virginia had a love for various activities, such as playing Pinochle and Bingo. She also enjoyed fishing and was an avid crocheter. Virginia considers the most amazing part of her life to be her marriage to Walter. In terms of her approach to longevity, Virginia emphasizes the importance of a good diet, including garden foods and Montana beef. Her favorite quote, "just live a good, clean life," reflects her simple and positive outlook on life. Even in her later years, Virginia remains active and engaged in her community.
